In Blinker the Star's deliciously retro world, the Electric Light Orchestra never broke up, Pink Floyd still records orchestral concept albums, and the 1980s never happened.

The Canadian trio's second major-label effort is a refreshing return to the swirling glory of 1970s art rock, starting with its roots in the late Beatles albums and ending in the lush pre-newwave sounds of ELO and Queen.

As with a certain subset of the art rock that the band echoes, the lyrics of Blinker the Star are cryptic, poetic and even a bit racy

in a murky sort of way.

But, frankly, the lyrics are beside the point. The luscious wall of sound — the violins, the synths, the choral backup singing makes this an album worth hearing. — Sean Scully
